From the Editor


Summer is nearly over and autumn days are fast approaching, with the leaves on the trees changing colour and producing their blanket of colour.

THE REV ROBERT A HAMILTON



Robbie is currently minister of The New Wellwynd Parish Church Airdrie and has been there for 22 years. After graduating from New College, Edinburgh in 1993 he served as Probationer Assistant at Hamilton Old after which he took up his first charge in Irvine at the Relief Parish Church, Bourtreehill in 1995. As a parish minister he has continually aspired to giving folk a good experience of church and of faith - as a worship leader and pastor, enabler and encourager. This has extended beyond the immediate congregation with his involvement as a chaplain to two schools and the Air Training Corps as well as bodies such as Airdrie Citizens Advice and Airdrie Savings Bank. He has served in various roles within the Presbyteries where he has served including as Depute Clerk, Ministries Convener and Moderator. He has also served nationally continuing his support of ministers and ministers in training - the Board of Ministry, the

Ministries Council and Faith Nurture. He is currently Convener of the Registration of Ministries Committee. Ongoing training through the Study Leave Scheme has been important to him with a particular interest in Christian nurture.

Robbie grew up in Saltcoats and has been married to Carol for 32 years. They have one son Daniel who is 24 and a crazy but cute dog called Rosie. They enjoy travel both at home and abroad and are getting back into caravanning having bought a new van last year. Robbie counts as a passion music - listening and playing (attempting to play the piano). He is looking forward to getting back to regular concerts in Glasgow and is hoping to get back to choral singing again having been in various choirs since schooldays including the Phoenix for a short time.

Robbie is looking forward to this new chapter and hopes that his experiences of church and community as well as his style of ministry which seeks to encourage and enable will stand him in good stead.

PASTORAL CARE

VENDA SCHOOL UPDATE

Dear All,

Greetings from Venda, where I am currently on a research visit for August. I have been spending time at Vhutshilo School during my stay here, and it is bustling with life as usual! Our numbers just keep on growing, and the support from the Church of Scotland is absolutely fundamental to our continued success. We now have a total of 93 children spanning from pre-school age to Grade 2 (from age 7-8), and we have recently employed a new teacher to help with the increase in numbers. Of course, infrastructure needs to grow at the same time, and the ablution block built by the very generous donation from Stuart and Patricia Robertson is being put to good use!

We had some sad news with the passing of a longtime supporter and Board Member, Mr Elias Nengwenani. Those of you who visited here on one of the visits may remember him – a gentle and generous soul who will be missed. At a meeting last week, we voted in a new Board member and I am delighted to report that Mr Nengwenani will be replaced by Ms Wavhoo Nevhungoni. Wavhoo was adopted by Suzi Cook (the school founder) when she was 3 years old and has been central to setting up support groups for young people living with HIV in Venda. She spoke at Westburn during a visit when she was 10 years old and is now a Social Worker. She will be a breath of fresh air in the running of the school, and we are looking forward to having her officially on board.

Thank you so much for your continued and generous support and sponsorship. The consistent financial injections from Scotland every month are put directly into feeding, clothing and teaching the children, and we are truly grateful. Thanks also to my mum (Monica McNeill) for coordinating the nuts and bolts of the Church sponsorship, and please feel free to contact her if you would like to sponsor a child or make a donation to our wonderful school, which was built by donations from church members in and around Inverclyde.

A very big thank to all of you who collect your used postage stamps and leave them at the church for me. I have sent away 4 packages already this year to the Church of Scotland World Mission Stamp Project to assist with their work, which is amazing.

The project that is being supported for 2023-24 is called Firmly Planted. It is a community-based agroforestry initiative with the ambition of making a sustainable impact across Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. It is spearheaded by our partners in the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP), and built around the church's community structures. This year stamp appeal proceeds will go towards establishing new tree nurseries. The Church of Scotland Guild is also supporting this project.

If you have not been involved with this work before, it is really easy. All you need to do is cut off any used postage stamps from the mail that you receive, leaving a 1- centimetre border of paper around the edge of the stamp. Please make sure that the stamp is only on single thickness of the envelope as double thickness just adds unnecessary weight to the packaging. Pre-paid or pre-printed stamps aren't accepted - it has to be physical stamps. It is helpful if you can put foreign and UK stamps in different envelopes, as I have to separate them before sending.

Then pop your collection of used stamps in an envelope or polythene bag and

- place them in the red basket in the foyer of the church centre,
- leave them on the table on the way into the sanctuary or
- hand them directly to myself at any time.

If you are not able to attend church, but want to collect stamps for this project, that is also fine. Just give me a call on 01475 723691 and I can make arrangements to collect them from you when you are ready to pass them on.
